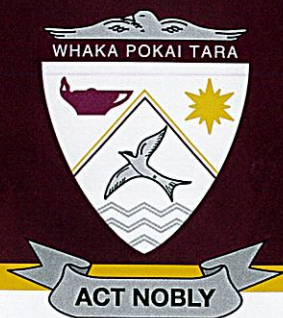


Papatoetoe Intermediate School

Tēnā koutou katoa to all our whānau and incoming tamariki.

Life as an educator, if you know it's your calling, is a state of being. I love my job and I'm deeply passionate about what education can do. Seeing our young people realise their potential at the coalface is an absolute privilege.

Stepping into the principalship at Papatoetoe Intermediate is an exciting new chapter. Our school has a long and rich history. We celebrate our roots, our community history, the staff and students who have passed through these doors, and those who have gone on to be high achievers in their fields.

Intermediate education is one of the most rewarding places to be - I love it! My own recollection of my intermediate years is filled with pure fun - doing lots of different things, giving everything a go, and making the absolute most of what was offered. CREATING AND PURSUING OPPORTUNITIES CAPABLE STAFF; EMPOWERING STUDENTS

Year 8 students return to school on Thursday 28th January 2027 at 8.30 a.m.

Year 7 students and any new Year 8 students begin with a Powhiri on Friday 29th January 2027 at 8.45 a.m.

Arrival

School gates open at 8.00 a.m.

Students need to be in their classrooms by 8.30 a.m., so they are ready for the morning karakia and to start their school day at 8.45 a.m.

Costs

We charge 'no' school fees. Our school does receive the MoE subsidy, and all costs are subsidized. The only costs to families are travel expenses for trips, camps and EOTC [Education Outside the Classroom]. We aim to request no more than \$20.00 per term [with exception of Camp Week in 2028, and EOTC Week in 2027]. Our aim is to have all students attend field trips etc. and so have some options regarding payments.

EOTC Week is held in each 'odd' year and Camp Week is held in each 'even' year.

School Camp will therefore be held for all students in 2028.

Attendance - Every student at school every day

Parents/Caregivers, by law, must ensure their children attend school. Schools are required, by law, to check all absences from school. Therefore, we must have a note or medical certificate to explain a child's absence.

A phone call, text or an email to your child's class teacher or to, student.rec@papint.school.nz or admin@papint.school.nz, advising us of an absence is appreciated, because, it helps us account for the whereabouts of students each day and increases the safety of your child.

Our school automatically sends texts [by 10.30 a.m. each day], to caregivers if a child is not at school and the family has not informed the school of the reason for their absence. This is to ensure student safety, and we ask parents to be diligent in responding.

In cases of concerning attendance an Engagement Worker [EWIS] may visit your home to inquire how we can support your child to attend regularly.

Bicycles/Skateboards/Scooters

Our school has a bike track and bikes for students to use. Students are encouraged to cycle to school. Safety checks are provided for every bike. We have a secure compound to store these. It is however the responsibility of students to chain their bike, scooter or skateboard to the stands provided. Parents are expected to ensure their children have and wear helmets that meet the required safety standards.

Bus Travel

Bus services are currently organised through Auckland Transport – [subleased to Ritchies]. A bus route schedule and contract will be issued at the beginning of the year. This can be subject to change several times during the year. School buses leave from Great South Road by 3.10 p.m. each day [except for specially notified occasions].

Students must not eat or drink on the bus and must maintain a high quality of behaviour. Those who do not meet expectations may not be able to use this service.

Cell Phones

Students are not allowed cell phones during the school day. Cell phones **must** be handed in each day and collected at the end of the day. Cell phones are kept in a secure class security box that is kept in the School Office.

Students not handing in phones and having/using them during school hours may have them confiscated or banned from having them at school.

Communication

We welcome Parents/Whānau and encourage them to make appointments to discuss any concerns or questions about their children at school. This can be done directly with the teacher or through the Office.

Senior school leaders [Deputy and Associate Principals and SENCo] also invite Parents/Whānau who may wish to discuss requests, questions, or concerns.

We ensure regular contact with Parents/Whānau through our school newsletters which are emailed fortnightly. In addition, each class has a termly newsletter. We also have a school website www.papint.school.nz Occasionally urgent messages are sent via Facebook, text message or via Edge.

Our school also provides several ways to help parents/families get to know classroom teachers and staff members. These include – Powhiri, BBQ and Performance Nights, Information Evenings, 3 Way Conference and the Community Cultural Evenings; Hui and Fono.

Curriculum

Our curriculum is made up of all the essential learning areas; English, Mathematics and Statistics, Science, Health, Social Studies including Aotearoa NZ Histories and Te Ao Maori, and Digital Technologies along with Arts [Performing Arts, Visual Arts, Music] and Technology [Hard Materials, Soft Materials, Foods, Design]. Students also have the provision to be involved with learning another language during Cultural Academies and Enrichment Programmes.

Teaching is learner-focused; promoting active involvement by students in setting learning goals and supporting our students to be authors of their own learning pathways. Parents/ Whānau are asked to work in conjunction with teachers, supporting them to maintain positive and productive communication.

Dates

Included is a single sheet with the 2027 Term Dates. The School Calendar is updated regularly on the School Website and also the noticeboard on Great South Road.



Devices

There are chrome books available for every student to use in classes. Access to the school internet is approved once:

1. The parent/caregiver provides written permission.
2. The student completes a cyber safety training and signs the agreement.

Enrolments

We can only accept students living in our school zone other than students enrolled in the Tironui Music School, or International Students. The Enrolment Scheme and school zone can be found on our school website.

Papatoetoe Intermediate School is a signatory of the Code of Practice for the Pastoral Care of International Students. We do not provide homestays. All information is available on our school website.

Free Lunches in Schools

Papatoetoe Intermediate School Board hopes to be able to continue to provide food for our students in 2027. Lunch is delivered to classes just prior to our lunch eating time. To organise the correct food, for each student, every day of each term, families will be asked to complete and return a questionnaire about dietary needs.

Students receiving lunches will only need to bring a drink of water each day to school. Students will continue to be offered a healthy 'brain' snack at 9.30 a.m. and fruit each day.

Papatoetoe Intermediate School is a 'water' only school. No other drinks allowed

Internet Safety

Students' use of the internet via their school Google account is always monitored, whether they are at school or at home. If students are using the internet in inappropriate ways a notification will be sent to their Whanau Leader. The matter will be investigated and whanau notified.

Kapa Haka

We have a strong kapa haka group for students and their families to join. Participation is not limited to just Maori students – all are welcome. Students are expected to attend after-school and Saturday practices.

Kids Can/Fruit In Schools

We are very lucky to be supported by 'KidsCan' and 'Fruit in Schools'.

Our students have available to them all year round a black jacket, shoes and socks, fresh fruit, daily, and brain snacks.

Monitoring Student Wellbeing

Our school uses 'PULSE' to help monitor Student Wellbeing. Students are sent an electronic 'check in' where they can identify their current state of wellbeing and if necessary, ask for help. PULSE is monitored by school leaders and teachers and follow-up provided within the week. Students sometimes receive additional support with our Social Worker in School (SWIS).

Students can report bullying at any time to teachers or senior leaders or through PULSE. We encourage students, and whanau, to speak with or email teachers or Whanau Leaders if they have concerns about their child's safety or wellbeing.

School Board

Our School Board 'governs' the school direction and works closely with and to support the Principal who is responsible for day to day management of our school. They meet at least 8 times a year. Meetings take place in the main Meeting Room [entrance off Great South Road] and meeting dates and times are advertised in our School Newsletter and on our School Website.

Members of the public, who wish to attend, are most welcome. Members of the public who attend do not have speaking rights unless invited to speak. We encourage you to notify the Board Chair or Board Secretary – Barbara Ferregel [barbaraf@papint.school.nz] prior to the meeting, if you would like to speak.

If you wish to view the agenda for a Board meeting it can be obtained from the office on the Wednesday before the meeting. Minutes of the Board meetings are available on our school website, after they have been ratified at a Board meeting.

Security Gates

Our school has security gates. This is to increase school security and student safety. There is access at the gate by speaker to the reception for emergencies. To protect our children please do not drive into the gateway or school grounds to drop off or pick up your child. Whanau can only use the Great South Road entrance during the school day.

Sickness and Accidents

Minor accidents are attended to by staff members who hold a current First Aid Certificate. In the cases of accident or illness of a more serious nature, parents are notified as soon as possible. In cases of extreme emergency, and on occasions when parents or nominated caregivers cannot be contacted, the staff will determine what should best be done to care for your child. All staff members receive regular first aid training to support their work with our students.

Please ensure emergency contact details and medical information are reviewed and always kept up to date.



The 'STAR' Way

We are a 'STAR' School. Our expectations are based around SAFETY, TRUST, ATTITUDE and RESPECT.

Papatoetoe Intermediate School students are expected to always behave well showing courteous, thoughtful, and responsible behaviour. We ask them to speak and act in ways that they would be happy for their parents/ caregivers to observe and be told about. Behaviour which is normally regarded as offensive or against the laws of New Zealand is not accepted.

Our students receive 'STAR' points for being a 'STAR' student. The STAR Award is drawn at Assembly.

Sports

We offer a range of sporting codes. Students must sign up to participate. Practices are often held out of school times. We always need whanau support for coaching and management of teams.

Sports Academy – for the last 5 years the students in the Sports Academy have attended Sports Camp in September of each year. We plan to continue this in 2027.

Stationery

With this Prospectus you will receive a single sheet of paper listing your child's stationery requirements. Stationery must be bought before the first day of school. It is important that every stationery item is marked with your child's name before school starts. Stationery Packs will be available from our School Office for approximately \$25.00.

Stationery remains in the class over the holidays and is used over the two-years students spend at our school. Parents/Whanau will need to replace items as they are used.





Student Leaders

Student leadership is a feature at Papatoetoe Intermediate School. Student Leaders are appointed in class and across the school. They attend meetings where they discuss issues under the guidance of a senior staff member. Student House Group Leaders apply for their positions in writing and undergo a vigorous interview process at the end of each year.

Head Leaders, Whanau Group Leaders and House Group Leaders are announced at our end of year Supreme Prize Giving in December.

All Year 8 students receive Leadership Responsibility Badges, indicating areas of responsibility. Replacement badges must be purchased if they are lost. Students are expected to wear these badges each day.

Valuables

Valuable Items may be put into the class security box which is secured in the office. The school cannot take responsibility for items of value – e.g. money or cell phones that go missing or damaged if they have not been placed in the locked class security box.

Students must put their cell phones in the security box.

Uniform

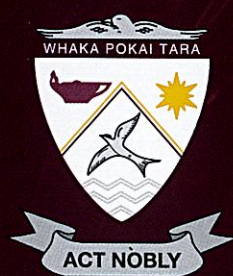
With this Prospectus you will receive a single sheet of paper listing your child's uniform requirements while they are at Papatoetoe Intermediate School. The school has a very small number of second-hand uniforms.

We are very lucky to be supported by KidsCan. Our students have available to them all year round a black jacket, black lace up shoes and socks. If your child requires any of these items, they only need to ask at our School Office.

At the end of Year 8, students are encouraged to donate at least one uniform item, in good condition, back to the school.

Students must have 'safe' shoes; crocs, jandals and dress sandals are not allowed.
